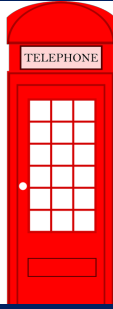
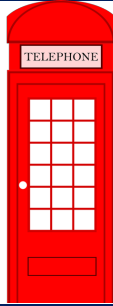

## HAMPTON COURT PALACE

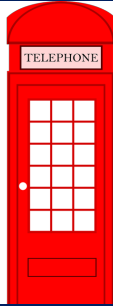
a royal palace in the borough of Richmond upon Thames presented to King Henry VIII by Cardinal Thomas Wolsey, renowned also for its hedge maze

T

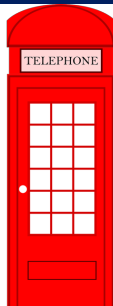
the meeting place of the Houses of Parliament of the United Kingdom



## ROYAL ALBERT HALL

opened in 1871 by Queen Victoria, one of the UK's most treasured and distinctive buildings, it is host to more than 390 shows in the main auditorium annually, including classical, rock and pop concerts



## MADAME TUSSAUDS

a wax museum in London displaying the waxworks of famous and historical figures, as well as popular film and television characters



## SHAKESPEARE'S GLOBE

L

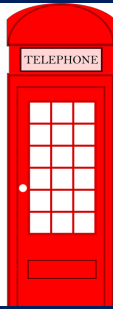
a reconstruction of an Elizabethan playhouse associated with the author of *Hamlet*, on the south bank of the River Thames



## TOWER OF LONDON

O

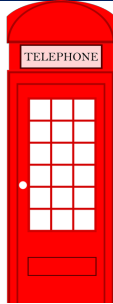
founded towards the end of 1066 as part of the Norman Conquest of England, the home of the Crown Jewels, guarded by the Beefeaters



## BUCKINGHAM PALACE

N

the workplace and the London dwelling used by the British monarch, crowds gather outside it to witness the renowned Changing of the Guard ceremony



## WESTMINSTER ABBEY

D

one of the UK's most significant religious structures, it has hosted many important events throughout its history such as weddings, burials and coronations, its construction began in 1245, on the orders of King Henry III



## WEMBLEY STADIUM

O

opened in 2007, crowned by the 134-metre-high (440 ft) arch, it has the largest roof-covered seating capacity in the world, it hosts both sports and music events



## THE LONDON EYE

N

a huge observation wheel also called the Millennium Wheel, the most widely visited paid tourist attraction in the UK, located adjacent to Jubilee Gardens



## CUTTY SARK

L

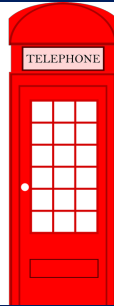
a British clipper ship displayed at a dry dock at Greenwich, London, built in 1869 she was one of the last tea clippers to be built and one of the fastest



HYDE PARK

A

established by Henry VIII in 1536 when he took the land from Westminster Abbey and used it as a hunting ground, free speech and demonstrations have been its key feature since the 19th century with Speaker's Corner established as a point of free speech and debate



PICCADILLY  
CIRCUS

N

a road junction in London built in 1819, particularly known for its video display and neon signs mounted on the corner building on the northern side, as well as the Shaftesbury memorial fountain and statue, which is mistakenly believed to be of Eros



TRAFALGAR  
SQUARE

D

a famous meeting place as well as the sight of celebrations, sporting events and protests, situated in the City of Westminster, it's home to Nelson's Column, several fountains, the famous fourth plinth and the National Gallery

M

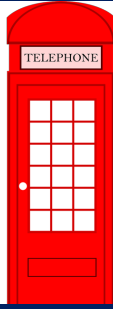
a royal residence in London, currently the official London residence of Prince William and his wife Kate

A

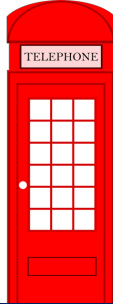
an art gallery located in London, holds the national collection of British art from 1900 to the present day and international modern and contemporary art

a combined bascule and suspension bridge in London, built between 1886 and 1894, features classic Victorian gothic architectural elements
