David Attenborough - a natural historian and a BBC presenter, he created a series of wildlife documentaries such as Life on Earth, The Living Planet and the Private Life of Plants

Daniel Day Lewis - an actor, he starred in My left Foot, In the name of the Father and Gangs of New York

Elizabeth II - the longest reigning British monarch

Helen Mirren - an English actress, she starred in The Madness of King George and Gosford Park

Michael Faraday - a famous scientist, the first person to discover electromagnetic induction

David Bowie - an English singer, songwriter and actor, one of his most famous albums is Let's Dance

Alfred Hitchcock - a film director and producer, among many other films, he directed Rear Window, The Birds and Psycho

Queen Victoria - Queen of the United Kingdom, Empress of India she reigned for 63 years

Keira Knightley - an English actress, she starred in Pride and Prejudice and Pirates of the Caribbean

John Keats - a Romantic poet, he wrote "Ode to a Nightingale", died of tuberculosis at the age of 25

Elizabeth Taylor - a British-American actress born in London, among other films she starred in Cleopatra, Cat on a Hot Tin Roof and Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?

David Beckham - an English retired professional footballer, he married "Posh Spice" Victoria

Clement Atlee - politician, Prime Minister of the United Kingdom from 1945 to 1951

Joan Collins - a London born Hollywood actress known for starring as Alexis in the American soap opera Dynasty

Charles Chaplin - a comic actor, filmmaker, and composer who rose to fame in the era of silent film, he made such films as The Kid, The Gold Rush and Modern Times

Samuel Pepys - famous for his personal diary in which he mentions such great 17th century events as the Great Plague of London and the Great Fire of London

Geoffrey Chaucer - an English poet and author widely considered the greatest English poet of the Middle Ages, he is best known for The Canterbury Tales

Tim Berners Lee - an English engineer and computer scientist, best known as the inventor of the World Wide Web

Elton John - is an English singer, songwriter, pianist, and composer, he composed the music for The Lion King

Thomas Becket - was Archbishop of Canterbury from 1162 to 1170. He engaged in conflict with Henry II, King of England, over the rights and privileges of the Church and was murdered by followers of the king in Canterbury Cathedral.

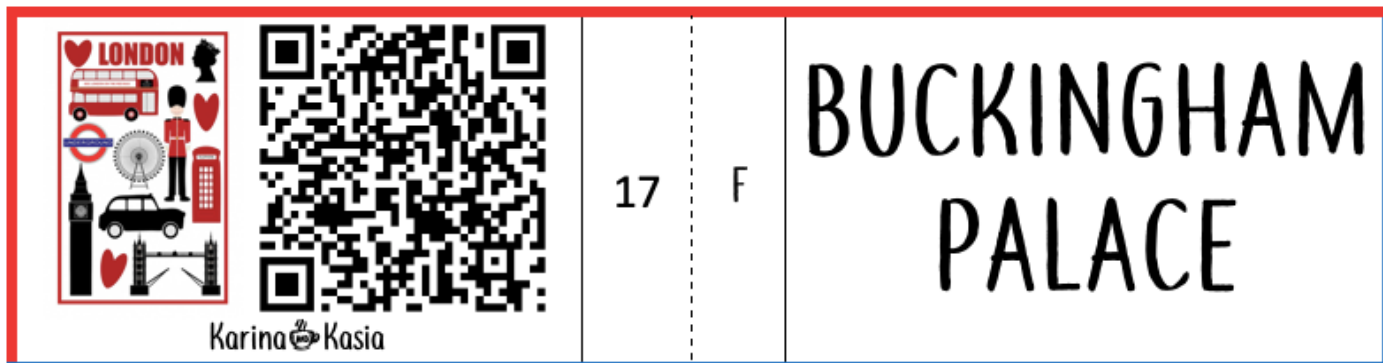
Kate Moss - an English model who rose to fame in the mid 1990s

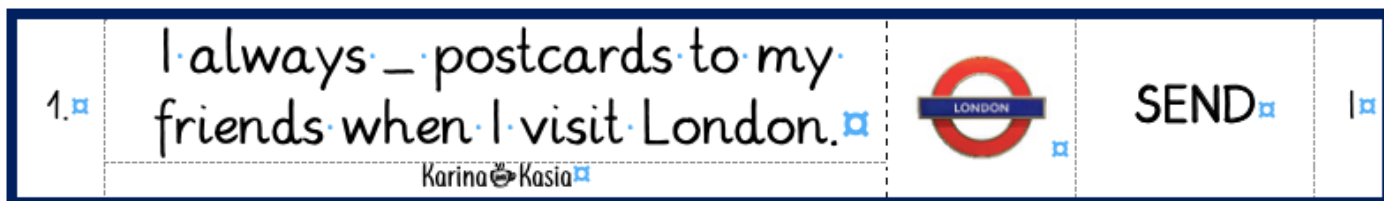

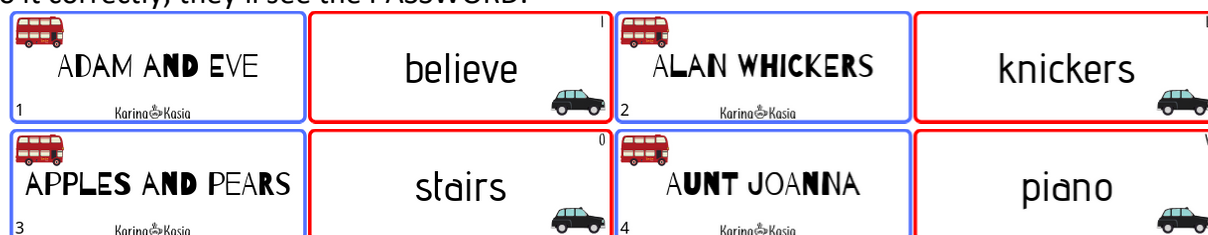

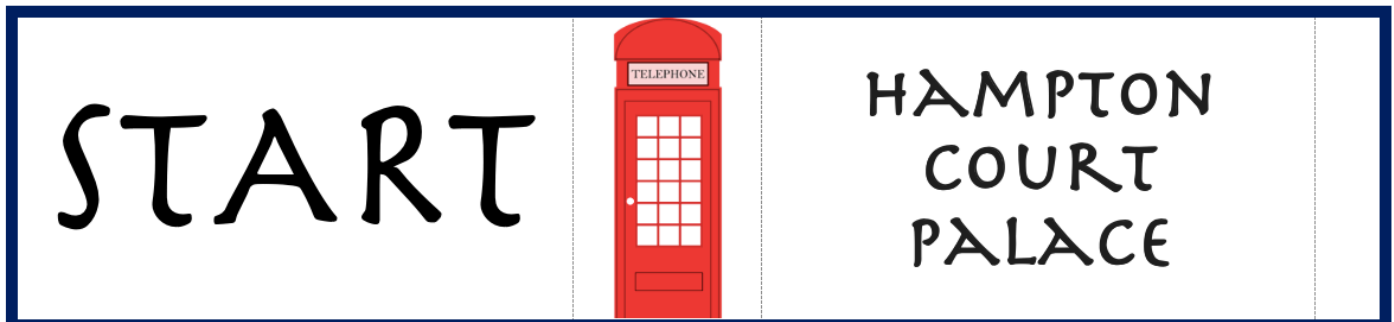

LONDON LANDMARKS DOMINO

1. **Hampton Court Palace** - a royal palace in the borough of Richmond upon Thames presented to King Henry VIII by Cardinal Thomas Wolsey, renowned also for its hedge maze
2. **The Palace of Westminster** - the meeting place of the Houses of Parliament of the United Kingdom
3. **Royal Albert Hall** - opened in 1871 by Queen Victoria, one of the UK's most treasured and distinctive buildings, it is host to more than 390 shows in the main auditorium annually, including classical, rock and pop concerts
4. **Madame Tussauds** - a wax museum in London displaying the waxworks of famous and historical figures, as well as popular film and television characters
5. **Shakespeare's Globe** - a reconstruction an Elizabethan playhouse associated with the author of *Hamlet*, on the south bank of the River Thames
6. **Tower of London** - founded towards the end of 1066 as part of the Norman Conquest of England, the home of the Crown Jewels, guarded by the Beefeaters
7. **Buckingham Palace** - the workplace and the London dwelling used by the British monarch, crowds gather outside it to witness the renowned Changing of the Guard ceremony
8. **Westminster Abbey** - one of the UK's most significant religious structures, it has hosted many important events throughout its history such as weddings, burials and coronations, its construction began in 1245, on the orders of King Henry III
9. **Wembley Stadium** - opened in 2007, crowned by the 134-metre-high (440 ft) arch, it has the largest roof-covered seating capacity in the world, it hosts both sports and music events

10. **The London Eye** - a huge observation wheel also called the Millennium Wheel, the most widely visited paid tourist attraction in the UK, located adjacent to Jubilee Gardens
11. **Cutty Sark** - a British clipper ship displayed at a dry dock at Greenwich, London, built in 1869 she was one of the last tea clippers to be built and one of the fastest
12. **Hyde Park** - established by Henry VIII in 1536 when he took the land from Westminster Abbey and used it as a hunting ground, free speech and demonstrations have been its key feature since the 19th century with Speaker's Corner established as a point of free speech and debate
13. **Piccadilly Circus** - a road junction in London built in 1819, particularly known for its video display and neon signs mounted on the corner building on the northern side, as well as the Shaftesbury memorial fountain and statue, which is mistakenly believed to be of Eros
14. **Trafalgar Square** - a famous meeting place as well as the sight of celebrations, sporting events and protests, situated in the City of Westminster, it's home to Nelson's Column, several fountains, the famous fourth plinth and the National Gallery
15. **Kensington Palace** - a royal residence in London, currently the official London residence of Prince William and his wife Kate
16. **Tate Modern** - an art gallery located in London, holds the national collection of British art from 1900 to the present day and international modern and contemporary art
17. **St Paul's Cathedral** - designed by Sir Christopher Wren, consecrated in 1708, it sits on Ludgate Hill, the highest point of the City of London
18. **Tower Bridge** - a combined bascule and suspension bridge in London, built between 1886 and 1894, features classic Victorian gothic architectural elements

This is a combined reading, grammar and vocabulary task with a QR code. First students read the text carefully and choose the correct option a,b,c that completes it. Next they take the QR code and colour BLACK only the squares which correspond to the questions where a) was the correct option (numbers 1,4,5,7,9). You might need to print out more QR codes, in case

students make a mistake. If they colour the QR code correctly, it will reveal (after scanning) the PASSWORD.

EXTRA TASKS –FLIPQUIZ/JEOPARDY type

The previous tasks contain all the answers to the flipquiz. You can use it for example as a revision or a class competition. There are two sets of questions for you to use.



Place one set of cards on the board 5x5 points facing the class, divide the class into teams, one by one students come to the board and choose the question to answer by their group. They read the question to the class, if the answer the question correctly, they get the points. If not, the other group can answer it and get the points. 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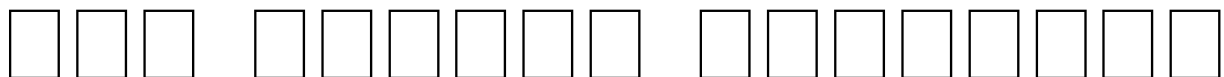
